Remodeled area and new exhibits

The Alf Engen Ski Museum opened its doors shortly after the 2002 Olympic Winter Games in May 2002. Over the past 20 years, the museum's Board of Trustees has continued to achieve its goal "To inspire guests by providing a rich assortment of interactive displays which allow visitors to gain insight into the development of winter sports throughout the Intermountain Area." The museum strives toward its vision "To be the recognized world leader in ski history museums." To these ends, an ambitious project started to take form in 2018.

The museum finds visitors returning to the museum several times a year knowing they will see one or more new exhibits that have been installed during the year. A "sub plot" of that effort is aimed at attracting new visitors. We educate and entertain close to 500,000 guests each year by offering two free museums - The Alf Engen Ski Museum and the Eccles 2002 Olympic Winter Games Museum.



In Spring 2018, concept plans for a major remodel of over one half of the museum were presented to the board by our exhibit design/install team, Unrivaled, located in Ogden, Utah.

Olympians, you made us proud!



The greater Park City-area sent 55 athletes to compete in the Beijing Olympics. The delegation dubbed 'Park City Nation' drew from athletes who grew up in Park City, training with one of the seven YSA-partner winter sports teams; athletes with close connections to Park City or athletes who make Park City their home. Athletes competed for six different countries.

Park City Nation finished in 12th place in the medal standings between Canada and Japan. Local athletes earned four gold medals, four silver medals, and two bronze medals. In 2014, Park City Nation, if competing as an independent country, would have finished 10th in the medal count, tied with Switzerland. In 2018, we finished 20th, tied with Australia.

The Paralympic Games are up next with Park City Nation heading to Beijing ready to compete!


INTERMOUNTAIN SKI HALL OF FAME

Located inside the Alf Engen Ski Museum, the Intermountain Ski Hall of Fame is one of the most popular exhibits, commemorating 86 individuals who have recorded exemplary achievements in skiing and snowboarding competition, innovation and development, and/or made significant contributions to the overall promotion of skiing and snowboarding in the Intermountain Region. Nominations are reviewed and inductee selections made by a committee from the University of Utah J. Willard Marriott Library Ski Archives.



WESLEY "WES" DEIST (1923 - 2008)

Wesley "Wes" Deist stands tall among the giants of skiing in the Intermountain West. Deist shared his love of skiing as a coach of the KKIFI and Kelly Canyon Ski Teams for over 62 years. He established ski schools and served as a certified ski instructor and examiner, a board member of the Idaho Division of the U.S. Ski Association and a two-term president of the Intermountain Division of the USSA. Deist helped develop skiing in the Idaho Falls Area and he was a one-time Golden Gloves boxer and elite Navy Seal during World War II, Through leadership and tireless volunteerism, he was known as the ultimate role model to his athletes. Deist's legacy features a lifetime of inspirational leadership and service.



LEIF ODMARK (1920 - 2004)

Leif Odmark, known as "Mr. Sun Valley," was born in Sweden in 1920 and was a Swedish National Ski Team Member in Cross country Skiing/Ski jumping. In 1948 he moved to Sun Valley, Idaho where he lived for 56 years. His passion for Crosscountry skiing and life-long efforts to share it reserve his place in the sport's history. Odmark coached the US Olympic Team in Cross-country/Nordic Combined in the 1952 Norway Olympic Games and, in 1970 founded the Sun Valley Nordic Ski School/Touring Center. Besides authoring numerous books, Odmark was a positive and dynamic force in his sport. He sponsored and staged free Cross-country clinics/races for the differently abled, seniors and children.



BRUCE TREMPER (1963 -)

Bruce Tremper is know for developing innovative avalanche forecasts, videos, classes and books used throughout North America in the work. Tremper's career spans 40 years as he is a prolific author, speaker, instructor, researcher, videographer and pioneering avalanche forecasting. Tremper developed multimedia backcountry avalanche forecasts, and has been featured in dozens of national and international avalanche documentaries and news programs. Tremper was a member of the Junior National Ski Team and the US Ski Team Talent Squad. In 1973 he was NCAA conference downhill champion. He served three decades as the Director of the Utah Avalanche Center.

JIM GADDIS: A UTAH SKI BOOSTER EXTRAORDINAIRE

Here is a question! For those who know Jim Gaddis, what would be an appropriate middle name to give him? Should you ask any number of knowledgeable ski enthusiasts, they will probably tell you Jim's middle name is "ubiquitous." To that I would certainly agree. Throughout the past six decades, for those who know Jim Gaddis, his record of achievements as a skiing legend and supporter/fund raiser for numerous ski related programs, puts him in a special category...namely one who excels everywhere he focuses his time and energy.

Although Jim is an all-around outstanding athlete, his "elite" status as an alpine skiing competitor qualified him for honorary membership in several prestigious institutions... namely, the Utah Sports Hall of Fame (1989); the U of U Crimson Club Hall of Fame (1989); and the Intermountain Ski Hall of Fame (2005). He was a three-time winner of the nationally recognized Alta Snow Cup (1962, 63, & 64), and was named "Intermountain Ski Racer of the Year" (1957, 58, 60, 62, & 63). In addition, Jim won the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Slalom and Combined title and the U.S. National Giant Slalom championships in 1962. In 2010, Jim was awarded the prestigious Utah Ski Archives S.J. Quinney Award for his years of skiing prowess as a two-time NCAA All American. In spite of all this, Jim experienced three untimely broken legs... which shortened his racing career and had an effect of keeping him out of possible Olympic participation.

However, impressive as that is, it only tells part of his remarkable record of achievements. Respect-ed ski historian, Mike Korologos, highlights that, "as far back as 50 years ago, Gaddis' ubiqiquitousness showed as he enthusiastically encouraged young racers to excel." In 1965, following his competitive skiing career, he initiated a special program for youth ski racing, ages 10 to 16. He named it the Gaddis Training Organization (GTO), capitalizing on the country's hottest model automobile at that time which carried that namesake. Under Jim's coaching, this group of skiers became very competitive in Intermountain Ski Association's junior racing tournaments and several members such as Craig Gorder, Tom McGee, Roxanne Toly, Robbie Lynn Beck, and Ralph Petty, went on to distinguish themselves in national and/or Olympic competition. Eventually, the Gaddis Training Organization was merged into what became the Park City Racing Team, again initially coached by Jim Gaddis.


During the 1970s, Gaddis started the Utah Ski Racers Foundation to provide financial aid to young "up-andcoming" ski racers, coached the Intermountain Junior National Ski Team and was a guest coach at several U.S. Ski Team training camps, as well.

In June 2016, a groundbreaking ceremony was held to start construction of the Spence Eccles Ski Team Building at the University of Utah. The fundraising efforts to achieve this significant accomplishment were chaired by none other than Jim Gaddis. For Gaddis' efforts, the completed ski team facility board room carries his namesake. At age 80 plus, Jim Gaddis is still active in a multitude of ski related activities, including being a donor and prolific fundraiser. He is a current and founding member of the Alf Engen Ski Museum Foundation, which oversees the popular Alf Engen Ski Museum and the George S. and Dolores Doré Eccles 2002 Olympic Museum at the Utah Olympic Park Joe Quinney Winter Sports Center. He also started the Youth Sports Alliance (YSA) organization which provides funding and scholarships for seven different sports...and established and raised 3 million dollars for the YSA -

Stein Eriksen Endowment. He is an honorary board member of the National Abilities Center; twice chair of the Heuga Express MS fundraiser; two-time chair of the U.S. Ski Team Intermountain Area Ski Ball; and has served on both the University of Utah and Park City hospital boards.

In 2021, Jim was specially recognized by receiving the Park City Rotary Club *Citizen Of The Year Award* and also honored by the Alf Engen Ski Museum Foundation who awarded him the prestigious *Crystal Award*.

As Mike Korologos observed, "Snow seems to invigortate Jim Gaddis." It has been that way for the past 60 years and it will be that way again when the


TRIBUTE TO THE SKI AND SNOWBOARD INSTRUCTORS


