# COME SEE OUR NEW EXHIBITS

On Tuesday November 27<sup>th</sup>, the Alf Engen Ski Museum unveiled three newly remodeled exhibits at an open-house event attended by over 100 guests. The featured exhibits included the new 'King of the Hill' trophy case which houses hundreds of Alf Engen's awards and trophies spanning several decades of competition, a redesigned Stein Eriksen exhibit and the 2018 version of the rotating Hometown Heroes exhibit. Several media outlets, including KSL Channel 5 and the Deseret News, were on site to document the unveiling and interview athletes and their families.

Museum Executive Director Connie Nelson and Board Chair Tom Kelly each delivered remarks to the crowd, as did Alan Engen who was instrumental in the early stages of the Museum's development and was very impressed with his father's new trophy case. By all accounts, the event was a great success. Several Intermountain Ski Hall of Fame members were in attendance, along with ski resort administrators, Museum Foundation Board members, and several athletes and their families. Special thanks to Done to Your Taste catering for providing event refreshments, and Unrivaled - the exhibit designers who helped bring these new exhibits to life.

#### King of the Hill Trophy Case

With crisp new wall graphics, an array of interior lighting, and an interactive touchscreen component, the new trophy case provides guests a more entertaining and engaging experience. Additionally, Alf's many trophies and awards have been reorganized by region, showcasing Alf's widespread competition dominance in Norway, Washington, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, California and, of course, Utah.

### 2018 Hometown Heroes

The rotating Hometown Heroes exhibit first opened in 2010, following the Vancouver Winter Olympic Games, and has since undergone several updates. The most recent version of the exhibit features several Park City athletes (Ted Ligety, Sarah Hendrickson, Lindsey Van), one Ogden athlete (Keith Gabel), and another originally from California, but now considered one of Park City's own (Brita Sigourney).

# Stein Eriksen: The Father of Freestyle Skiing

Maybe it's his perfectly coifed hair that draws guests to this popular exhibit. Originally installed as a temporary tribute to the legendary skier, the redesigned Stein Eriksen exhibit has become part of the Museum's permanent collection. Upgrades include a larger display case to house more artifacts, updated detailed information about Stein's impact on the sport of skiing and several new photographs of Stein in action.

Perhaps the most recognizable piece in the Stein Eriksen exhibit is his iconic Marius sweater. Hand-knit by Stein's mother, Birgit, it is a quintessential piece of ski clothing worn by Stein. Furthermore, the ski pants on display came from Stein's personal wardrobe.

# EDUCATIONAL FIELD TRIP PROGRAM IS THRIVING

The Alf Engen Ski Museum's Educational Field Trip Program turned 17 years old this year - and with a team of dedicated docents, a few new exhibits, and more than a dozen registered schools, it shows no sign of slowing down.

The program is designed for 4th grade classes and includes several different stations throughout the Museum where students learn about and discuss ski history, Utah weather patterns, avalanche danger, the 2002 Olympic Games and Park City's growth from a mining camp to a ski town. Additionally, students are taken on a guided tour of Olympic Park and given a gift bag packed with snow sport related items, a Junior Snow Ranger activity book and a voucher good for one ride on the Alf Engen Mountain Sport Simulator.

So far this year, approximately 700 students have taken part in the Educational Field Trip Program. Participating schools have included Trailside in Park City, Riverview Elementary in Spanish Fork, Muir Elementary in Bountiful, Ascent Academy in Lehi, North Summit in Coalville, Diamond Ridge in West Valley and Entheos Academy in Kearns.

# MEET OUR LATEST HOMETOWN HEROES

### Sarah Hendrickson

Ski Jumping Hometown: Park City, Utah

In 2012, Sarah Hendrickson was crowned the first ever female World Cup ski jumping champion, after winning an incredible 9 of 13 events that season. She followed up that perfor-



mance with another World Championship in 2013, becoming only the second American to do so, after teammate Lindsey Van in 2009. At the 2014 Sochi Olympics, Sarah drew bib #1 and took great pride in being the first woman ever to jump in an Olympic Games. In late 2017, at the U.S. Olympic Team Trials here at Utah Olympic Park, Sarah secured her spot on the 2018 Olympic team to the delight of her family, friends, and thousands of hometown fans. Despite finishing out of the medals at those Games, Sarah remains one of Park City's true Hometown Heroes.

#### **Brita Sigourney**

Halfpipe Skiing - Bronze Medalist Residence: Park City, Utah

Brita Sigourney's parents put her on skis as soon as she could walk. Throughout her life she's skied practically everything, in-



cluding aerials, slopestyle, halfpipe and moguls. Today she is one of the best female freeskiers in the world, specializing in halfpipe. After four consecutive years of season-ending injuries, the three-time X Games medalist battled back to the top of her sport to earn a spot on the inaugural U.S. Olympic halfpipe team. She finished sixth at the 2014 Sochi Games, and then returned in 2018 to win a bronze medal at the PyeongChang Winter Olympics. Although originally from California, Brita has lived and trained in Park City since 2011, making her one of our adopted Hometown Heroes.

### **Ted Ligety**

Alpine Skiing Hometown: Park City, Utah

Ted Ligety is a Park City native and one of the greatest giant slalom racers of all time. Among others, his achievements on snow include four Olympic appear-



ances (2006, 2010, 2014, 2018), two Olympic gold medals (2006, 2014) and five world championship titles. In 2013 he was also the first skier to earn three gold medals at a single world championship since Jean Claude Killy in 1968. Going into the 2018 PyeongChang Games, Ted had his sights set on his third Olympic gold medal. Unfortunately, it was not meant to be as Ted's best finish was 5<sup>th</sup> place in the alpine combined event. Regardless, Ted Ligety remains one of the hardest working skiers on the World Cup circuit and one of Park City's most beloved Hometown Heroes.

#### **Keith Gabel**

Snowboard Cross - Silver Medalist Hometown: Ogden, Utah

Keith Gabel was introduced to snowboarding in 2000, and he quickly developed a love for the sport. Five years later, Gabel was involved in an industrial accident that crushed his left foot and resulted in its amputa-



tion below the knee. Gabel returned to his snowboard three months later, but it wasn't until the 2010-11 season, his sixth season riding with an amputation, that he discovered competitive adaptive snowboarding and began training with the National Ability Center in Park City, Utah. As the sport progressed, so did Gabel, rising quickly through the international ranks, earning a spot on the first ever Paralympic Snowboard team heading to Sochi, Russia in 2014. There he won a bronze medal in the sport's Paralympic debut. At the 2018 PyeongChang Paralympics, Gabel bettered his Sochi performance with a silver medal in the snowboard cross event, becoming the world's first and only male two-time Paralympic medalist in this discipline, and thereby securing his legacy as a Hometown Hero.

### **Lindsey Van**

Ski Jumping Hometown: Park City, Utah

In the story of Park City's skiing history, Lindsey Van merits her own chapter. She started ski jumping at age seven and never looked back. Mentored by the great Alf Engen, Lindsey's first Olympic experience was at the 2002 Salt Lake City Games where she participated as a forejumper testing wind speed and landing conditions



by performing jumps prior to the competition's start. Despite being only 17 years old at the time, it was clear Lindsey was destined for greatness in the sport. During her career, she amassed 51 Continental Cup podiums, 16 National Championships, and was the first woman to ever win a World Championship in 2009 in Liberec, Czech Republic. Perhaps Lindsey's greatest achievement for the sport of ski jumping was her tenacious fight with the International Olympic Committee to recognize women's ski jumping as an official medal event. The year after losing a lawsuit against the organizers of the 2010 Vancouver Olympics, Lindsey's efforts were rewarded when it was announced that women's ski jumping would be included at the 2014 Sochi Olympics. It was there that Lindsey Van and her teammates made history and set the stage for generations of female jumpers to come.

For generations, Utah has proudly produced scores of elite winter athletes. In February 2018, the state's reputation was again on display in South Korea where over twenty Utah competitors took to ice and snow at the PyeongChang Olympic Winter Games. This exhibit recognizes all our local Olympians and highlights several as Hometown Heroes.







# ENGEN SKI TROPHY AWARDED TO LOCAL SKIER

The Alf & Alan Engen Ski Trophy is an annual award presented to young athletes who exemplify the competitive spirit, sportsmanship and leadership that characterizes Intermountain and U.S. National Ski Hall of Fame members, Alf and Alan Engen. The trophy is on permanent display near the exit of the Museum and now bears the name of the 2017-2018 recipient: 19-year-old cross-country skier, **Masha Johnstone**.

Masha grew up in Jackson Hole, Wyoming, and has been skiing since she could walk. She currently lives in Bozeman, Montana where she works for a nonprofit called The Station Foundation, an organization which helps servicemen and women returning from active duty restore family and community relationships.

Ski Meister: Masha, what do you love about skiing?

**Masha:** The biggest thing I love about skiing is the lifelong friendships you create with teammates and coaches. It's quite an incredible community.

SM: What are your skiing goals?

**M:** To feel comfortable with good and bad days, to believe I'm just as fast as the other girls and to walk out of training at the end of day knowing I had fun.

SM: Who would you like to thank for helping you with your skiing?

**M:** Three of my coaches from last year who helped me in so many ways: Gordon Lang, Ruff Patterson and Liz Stephens - for teaching me to breathe, for waxing my skis to perfection, pushing me to new levels and for believing in me every step of the way. A huge thank you also goes out to my parents for always supporting me - not only as an athlete, but in all aspects of life. Thank you, Mom and Dad.

**SM:** What advice would you give younger athletes?

**M:** Don't worry so much about results. Let the work come to you. Cross-country skiing is a long journey of ups and downs. Focus on the big picture and have fun!

Masha is spending this winter season healing from a few injuries and recovering from a lingering illness. She plans to get back on her skis this spring when she's once again healthy, strong and ready to have fun. In the fall, she will return to school at Montana State University where she plans to study psychology. Congratulations Masha on being awarded the Alf & Alan Engen Ski Trophy!

Note: The Museum is working with Utah Olympic Park's sports department to identify past recipients whose names will be retroactively added to the trophy.

# SUSTAINABILITY MATTERS

In November 2017, the Alf Engen Ski Museum joined Recycle Utah's Green Business Program, a program designed to help local businesses create sustainability goals and increase existing "green" endeavors.

During the first year of membership in the program, the Museum completely eliminated toxic products from their cleaning supplies inventory, replacing them with environmentally-friendly, non-toxic alternatives. Additionally, disposable floor mop heads and dusters were replaced with washable/reusable products, a change that not only reduces waste, but also saves more than \$500/year. Finally, the Museum increased its use of post-consumer content in paper and packaging materials. This includes all in-house print jobs and larger contracted production printing - like the Ski Meister newsletter!



Looking ahead, plans are in the works to upgrade to LED all the track lighting bulbs in the George S. and Dolores Doré Eccles Salt Lake 2002 Olympic Winter Games Museum. Furthermore, an ongoing system of e-waste collection has been implemented to ensure the safe disposal of used bulbs, batteries, ink cartridges and other miscellaneous office hardware.

Other small, day-to-day sustainability practices include eliminating single-use water bottles from company meetings and events, reusing exhibit materials (ie. plexiglass panels, foam board signage, etc.), trip-chaining errands and off-site meetings and encouraging employees to take advantage of public transit and on-site lunch options.

# FOLK ARTIST VISITS MUSEUM AND 'PAINTS THE TOWN'

Eric Dowdle is a renowned folk artist whose work is distributed throughout the world. He specializes in rural landscapes and cityscapes featuring customs, foods, families and activities common to each location. His work has taken him all over the globe and many of his art pieces have been manufactured into puzzles.

In the summer of 2017, Eric contacted the Alf Engen Ski Museum regarding a visit to Park City for his television program, "Painting the Town with Eric Dowdle." Now in its second year of production, episodes are filmed in a different place and features people, places, traditions and activities unique to that town. After touring the town and meeting locals, Eric creates a painting, depicting his experience and the people he met along the way.

Eric's visit included a tour of the Alf Engen Museum and 2002 Olympic Winter Games Museum. He rode the Mountain Sport Simulator and tried his hand on Alf's Take Flight Ski Jump Simulator. Afterwards, Eric's crew decided to visit historic Ecker Hill where they filmed what would end up being the closing segment of the Park City "Painting the Town" episode.

# INTERMOUNTAIN SKI HALL OF FAME - Class of 2018

September 20, 2018 - Three new members were inducted into the Hall of Fame, located at the Alf Engen Ski Museum.



#### GARY DESEELHORST (1938 - )

In 1977, Phoenix business executive, Gary DeSeelhorst, decided to seek a quieter career path. He answered an advertisement in the Wall Street Journal, purchased a small troubled ski area in Utah's Big Cottonwood Canyon, and spent the next 38 years nurturing Solitude Ski Resort into a world-class destination.

Gary's tireless efforts were validated when

readers of Ski Magazine selected Solitude as a top-rated resort in the country. In 2015, the family sold its interests in the European-style family-friendly Solitude Village and its challenging mountain to Deer Valley Resort.

In other contributions to the benefit of winter sports, DeSeelhorst led the effort to create a 17-mile-long sewer line that serves most of Big Cottonwood Canyon. #### BARBARA YAMADA (1946 - )

That winter sports thrive in the Intermountain Area can be attributed to a vital ingredient: selfless volunteers. In that arena, Barbara Yamada has few peers.

From officiating at collegiate, national, international, and Olympic/Paralympic Winter Games competitions, to helping preserve the area's rich history of winter sports, to conducting clinics and certifying race offi-

cials, to masterfully administering ski clubs and ski associations -- the name Barbara Yamada is at the forefront.

Her voluminous volunteer resume includes being a charter member of the Alf Engen Ski Museum Foundation Board and of the University of Utah J. Willard Marriott Library's Ski Archives Advisory Board, where she has served as chair of its annual Ski Affair since 2000.

Yamada's down-to-business work ethos expands well beyond winter sports. The University of Utah Athletic Department, the Adopt a Native Elder Program for the Navajo Nation, the Park City Institute and other organizations are among the beneficiaries of her tireless offerings.

Barbara Yamada has worked behind the scenes for decades helping showcase the best of the intermountain region's athletes and events. Now it's her turn in the spotlight.

#### MEL FLETCHER (1918 - 2010)

In the annals of Utah's skiing history, Mel Fletcher merits his own chapter. Its pages would regale readers with tales of "a human ski lift," a lift builder, trail-cutter, ski jumper, ski school director, ski patrol leader, ski club president and tireless servant in his hometown of Park City.

In 1946 he became Summit County's first ski school director at Snow Park, also called Frog Valley and now Deer Valley Resort. In

1965, Mel became ski patrol director at Treasure Mountain Ski Area (now Park City Mountain). From 1979 to 1981 he was patrol director at Parleys Summit (Gorgoza).

The grandson of a town barber, Mel's passion for Park City ran as deep as its silver mines. He was a volunteer for the fire department, the Park City School Board, the Park City Historical Society and the American Legion, among others.

Living to age 92, Mel watched the 2002 Olympic Winter Games unfold at his doorstep, and marveled at how far his beloved ski sport had advanced. It was a pleasure well deserved.
